## **A few words from the Moorpool Regeneration Group**

The **MRG** has, to a great extent, been in limbo since the judicial review failed. But then so have Grainger, who have done nothing to pursue their development plans other than make their usual quick buck by putting the sites up for sale. But now these have been bought by **Banner Homes**, things are again moving forward. Although perhaps sending out termination notices to garage owners without bothering to first read the leases was not the best first step.

A small group were invited to view Banner's initial plans for Sites A and C and share their vision of how a new development would sit within the existing estate. While the number of houses remains the same on the **Valley Site**, the revised layout appears more in keeping with the wider estate, access across the site will be retained, low level lighting would be used, and the use of a swale would obviate the need for tanking under the few remaining allotments and the subsequent maintenance issues. The proposals for the garage site off Ravenhurst remain largely unchanged.

More significantly perhaps is that directors of Banner presented these plans themselves, seemed receptive to suggestions, and were aware of the history of the

estate and how a successful development could enhance their company reputation. This is in direct contrast to **Grainger** who, through Representative Hoare, showed total disregard for the historic significance of the estate and the views of its residents.

However, there is still the loss of most of the allotments on the **Valley Site**, inadequate parking arrangements for the vehicles that will be displaced from the garages and forced onto already congested narrow streets, overlooking issues, particularly at Site C, and, of course, the overarching objection to the development of new housing within an enhanced conservation area in the first place. Additionally, should Banner gain planning permission for their revised application, the current section 106 conditions are negated and any new ones will need to be scrutinised carefully.

Banner's final plans will go on general display in due course and invite feedback from all residents before being submitted to **BCC** for approval.

## **uPVC windows**

There has been press coverage recently about Bournville Village Trust fitting plastic windows on their Estate. BVT owns a considerable area of property extending as far as Telford in Shropshire and covering a variety of property styles and ages. The properties which have been fitted with plastic windows are not in the garden suburb conservation area and we have been advised that the conservation department would be unlikely to support such a change. The decision to favour wooden windows in a conservation area is not peculiar to Moor Pool but is a consistent across the country. An important part of the argument for using wood seems to be achieving consistency and this is why all replacements of windows on the Estate require planning permission. The visual amenity of the Estate has significantly improved since the introduction of the 4(2) Direction as old windows which have had glazing bars removed have been replaced with original
